<i>Migosi Orphanage Home and Ogango Primary School</i>	<p>Migosi: the nursery class (ages 3-10) in term-time and all ages (3-16) in the vacation period.</p> <p>Ogango: all standards (1-8) in term-time and standards 6-8 (roughly ages 15-18) in the holidays.</p>	<p>Migosi: around 10 pupils in the nursery class and up to 15 in classes or workshops open to everyone. (The number often depended on how many chores there were to be done that day!).</p> <p>Ogango: about 40-50 in each class.</p>	<p>Migosi: basic English (e.g. alphabet, numbers, colours) and creative activities with the nursery children and HIV/AIDS workshops, discussion-based English lessons and team games with the older ones.</p> <p>Ogango: English reading, writing and discussion.</p>
<i>Pandipieri and the Remand Centre</i>	<p>Pandipieri: N.F.E. phases 1-3 (children aged 9 to 18).</p> <p>Remand Home: mainly 12-18 year olds, but sometimes the younger classes as well.</p>	<p>Pandipieri: around 20 children in phase 1 and 15 in phases 2 and 3.</p> <p>Remand Home: a maximum of thirty in life skills classes (all the children there aged 12-18).</p>	<p>Pandipieri: poetry and life skills (particularly drug abuse) with the street children.</p> <p>Remand Home: life skills, including HIV/AIDS.</p>
<i>TEMAK and Kudho Primary School</i>	<p>TEMAK: the nursery (4-11 years old) and the girls, aged 15-21, who attend the workshops there.</p> <p>Kudho: mainly standards 6-8, as they continue at school during the holidays.</p>	<p>Roughly 40 to a class in both placements – although at Kudho teachers say that the number can rise to 80 (!) in term-time.</p>	<p>TEMAK: basic English with the nursery children and Life Skills workshops with the older girls.</p> <p>Kudho: English lessons.</p>
<i>Vision and Passion and Rabour Primary School</i>	<p>VISPA: the nursery (3-7 years old).</p> <p>Rabour: standards 6-8.</p>	<p>VISPA: 38 children (and 4 teachers).</p> <p>Rabour: 50 in term-time and about 30</p>	<p>VISPA: English songs and games and creative arts, e.g. painting.</p>

		during the holiday.	Rabour: HIV/AIDS workshops.
<i>Noble Charity Home and Alango Primary School</i>	Noble: one class, in the holidays, of children aged 3-14 (the oldest in 2006 was in standard 5). Alango: standards 6-8.	Noble: variable – 20 on average. Alango: around 30.	Noble: basic Maths and English. Alango: English lessons.
<i>Mama Ngina's and Kisumu Union Primary School</i>	This placement was cancelled. The two volunteers at Vision and Passion and Rabour Primary School, however, started to visit Mama Ngina's midway through the project, two mornings a week. They concentrated on doing games and creative activities with a group of 10-15 of the younger children.		
<i>Vihiga Children's Home</i>	Nursery to standard 5.	Between 5 and 22.	English, Maths and Creative Art.
